FATHER, FORGIVE THEM

Louis Zamperini was a survivor. In 1943 he found himself in a series of unfortunate events during his time in the US Air Force. When his plane crashed into the ocean, he drifted at sea for 47 days before being "rescued" by the Japanese military and placed in a prison camp.

Still Zamperini endured. He suffered immensely, especially at the hands of one particular prison guard—Mutsuhiro Watanabe, who was also known as "The Bird". After two years, Zamperini was freed. However, the horrors of his imprisonment haunted him at home. Zamperini became an angry alcoholic, and that anger and hatred ate away at his soul. The bottle and his own nightmares did what The Bird couldn't do: they broke him.

One day, in an attempt to save their crumbling marriage, Zamperini's wife insisted that he attend a gospel meeting. Zamperini agreed, and as he listened, he thought of all the times he'd prayed for God's deliverance and all the times God had answered him; indeed, God was the reason that Zamperini could call himself a survivor.

On that day, Zamperini gave himself to Christ, praying for for-giveness and deliverance from all the pain his PTSD was causing. From that day on, he made it his goal to personally try and find those who had wronged him and extend forgiveness to them. In 1950, Zamperini visited a Tokyo prison holding several of his former prison guards. He forgave them. In 1998 Zamperini returned to Japan once again, and tried to meet The Bird, but Watanabe refused to speak with him. Zamperini forgave him anyway.

To me, Zamperini's ability to show mercy and forgiveness is the most impressive thing we as Christians can take away from his life's story. Despite horrific treatment and tragedy, Zamperini, with God's help, was able to forgive his tormentors. His actions mirrored those of Christ, when he said of his tormentors, "Father, forgive them, for they do not know what they are doing" (Luke 23:34). In the same way, let us forgive those who hurt us. In doing so, we will be more like Christ, who has forgiven us of so much more.
